This comprehensive workshop explores the different areas in which caregivers influence children. How can you assess problem behaviour, and then strategize effective responses to support wanted behaviour and healthy child development? The four main areas discussed are environment, self-esteem and self-definition, consequences, and biological considerations such as temperament. Strategies discussed include child directed and other forms of play, effective role modeling, effective use of directives and encouragement, understanding steps of discipline and when (and when NOT to) use them, how tone and other factors affect messaging, and understanding and accommodating for temperament and capacity issues.

Christopher Burt holds a Master's Degree in Counselling Psychology, and is a Parenting and Family Development specialist with over 20 years of professional experience working with children, youth and families. Christopher has extensive knowledge of family system dynamics and child and family development issues. Christopher is experienced with challenging family issues, separation and divorce, neglect and abuse, extreme conflict, child protection, child conduct issues and parenting, and interfamilial issues. Christopher is a Family Counsellor and coordinates a range of family programs under contract with the Ministry of Children and Family Development. Period of Purple Crying: A New Way to Understand Your Baby's Crying

Prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome BC, a program of BC Children's Hospital, is implementing the Period of PURPLE Crying. This is a new way to understand why some babies cry more than others in their first 5 months of life. It explains what is normal, what you can expect when your baby cries, and how to keep your baby safe. The research is based on 25 years of study on infant crying by leading development and medical experts.

You will learn about:

- Shaking is very dangerous
- Crying and "colic" are normal
- Crying is the most common stimulus to shaking and abuse

Rosey has been working in the child care field for over 10 years. She is currently working with Surrey Child Care Options in the areas of Subsidy/Referral and Early Years Library. She has previously facilitated the Good Beginnings: An Introduction to Family Child Care course.
